SAFETY MOMENT

Every summer, heartbreaking and preventable deaths happen when children and pets are left alone in hot cars.

This happens when kids or pets are left unattended in a hot car -- sometimes because the driver forgot the child was there -- or when kids get into unlocked cars without any adult knowing it happened. Within minutes, they can be in danger. Here is what you must know:

1. No Exceptions, No Matter How Brief

Some parents may not want to take their child in and out of their cumbersome car seat for what they believe will be a quick stop. But the stakes are too high.

"It is never OK to leave kids or pets in a car -- even with the windows down," says Christopher McStay, MD, an emergency room doctor and assistant professor of emergency medicine at New York University Langone Medical Center."

"There is no safe amount of time to leave children alone in the car," says Nathan Allen, MD, an emergency medicine doctor at the University of Chicago.

Just a few minutes can be extremely dangerous -- even fatal -- for a small child or pet.

2. Know What Can Go Wrong

On a day that is just 72 degrees Fahrenheit, the temperature inside a car can increase by 30 to 40 degrees in an hour and 70% of this increase occurs the first 30 minutes.

Heat stroke may occur when body temperature passes 104 degrees Fahrenheit. That overwhelms the brain's temperature control, causing symptoms such as dizziness disorientation, agitation, confusion, sluggishness, seizure, loss of consciousness, and/or death

3. Bystander? Get Involved

If you see a child alone in a hot vehicle, call 911 immediately, advises the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). "If they are in distress due to heat, get them out as quickly as possible," states the NHTSA's web site.

4. Remind Yourself

Some parents or caregivers may forget that there is a sleeping child in the back seat and go about their business.

What can you do? Give yourself reminders. Keep telling yourself, out loud, to remember the child. And give yourself visual cues. For example, place your briefcase beside your child so you must grab it before going to work, and will see your child. Or put your diaper bag on the seat next to you, so that you're reminded that you have the child with you.

ENGINEERING REPORT: JUNE 2018 CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION

<u>Pump Stations Rehabilitation and Replacement (7004, 7005, 7008, 7011):</u> Rehabilitate or Replace three pump stations and connect them to new Gravity Pipeline.

The RESCU Program includes rehabilitation or replacement of the Belmont, Redwood City, and Menlo Park Pump Stations, as well as the construction of the Belmont Force Main to connect the Belmont system to the Gravity Pipeline. Preliminary design work has been completed by Brown and Caldwell. SVCW has decided to deliver these projects as a combined Progressive Design Build Project, with Brown and Caldwell acting as Owner's Advisor. SVCW has prepared an RFQ to solicit Design-Build teams' interests and will bring to the Commission for issuance approval.

Planned Commission Actions: Approve Issuance of RFQ – July 2018 Approve Project Management Services – July 2018

<u>Gravity Pipeline (6008) and Front of Plant Projects (6013, 6014, 9160)</u>: Deliver these two RESCU projects using a Progressive Design Build delivery method.

On October 5, 2017 the Commission awarded a contract to Barnard/Bessac Joint Venture (BBJV) for the Stage 1 Progressive Design Build contract on the Gravity Pipeline project. On November 9, 2017 the Commission awarded a contract to Shea/Parsons Joint Venture for the Stage 1 Progressive Design Build contract on the Front of Plant project.

The JV teams, SVCW staff and consultants are co-located in office trailers to facilitate close coordination for designs, O&M options and construction teams.

The JV teams are in the process of preparing packages for early construction approval from SVCW. A package for the Front of Plant (Stage 2A) was approved by the Commission in June. Another package (Stage 2B) for SOE subcontractor mobilization will be presented to the Commission for approval in July. A package for the Gravity Pipeline and a third package from the Front of Plant (Stages 2A and 2C, respectively) will be brought to the Commission in August.

<u>Planned Commission Actions:</u>Approve FoP Stage 2B Amendment – July 2018 Approve FoP Stage 2C and GP Stage 2A Amendments – August 2018 **Energy Storage Project (9180):** Contract with system provider to build and operate a battery system for the plant

In April 2017 the Commission authorized staff to negotiate a contract with a system provider to design, build, and operate a battery storage system for the plant's electrical loads. SVCW has had discussions with AMS to provide these services, including the application for a SGIP grant from PG&E. SVCW staff will be bringing the contract to Commission for approval.

Planned Commission Actions: Approve Contract - August 2018

Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements Phase 2 (9169, 9173, 9186, 9189, 9197, 9220, 9224): Rehabilitation and/or replacement of seven treatment plant mechanical processes.

SVCW received and evaluated two Design-Build (DB) firms in accordance with criteria outlined in the Request for Qualifications. Both firms were deemed qualified and received Requests for Proposals (RFP). The RFP's were issued on December 7, 2017 and were submitted on February 9, 2018. Staff interviewed both DB firms in March 2018 with the intent to make a recommendation at the April Commission meeting.

<u>Planned Commission Actions:</u>Accept Project and File Notice of Completion -TBD

Emergency Repair of the 12kV Vault (9808): Respond to emergency condition of existing 12 kV service.

On September 14, 2017 the Commission approved the emergency expenditure of funds for the repair of essential facilities. On November 9, 2017 The Commission later approved a total budget amount of \$2,347,412 which includes the initial emergency authorization of \$300,000 to perform work on a time and material basis to resolve the 12kV failing electrical vault. Beecher Engineering, Power Engineering and DW Nicholson designed a permanent repair to reroute route the 12 kV conduits that supply power to the Solids Handling Building (SHB) and ultimately to all plant equipment and processes.

Temporary electrical power is currently supplying electricity to three main Plant transformers. A new concrete vault was placed on the main building side of the tunnel and is incorporated into the tunnel structure. A new conduit run was constructed along the building to the new vault at the tunnel. Power Engineering completed excavation under the SHB by the transformers and constructed a new duct bank structure under the transformers to connect the 12kV power lines to the

new vault at the tunnel. The underground tunnel is pile supported and will offer the most stable pathway between the buildings to ensure the new conduits and vault will not subside in the future.

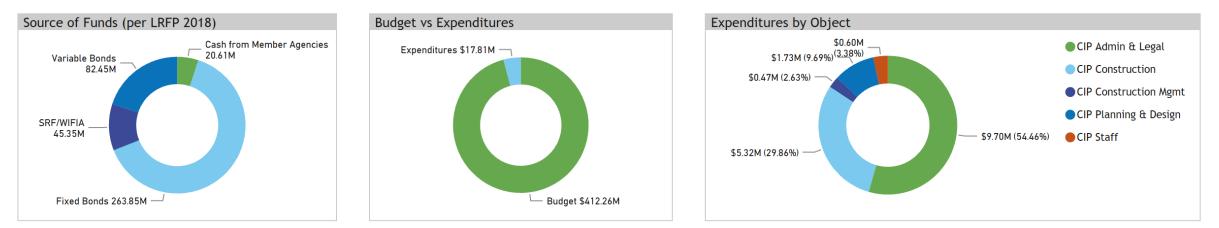

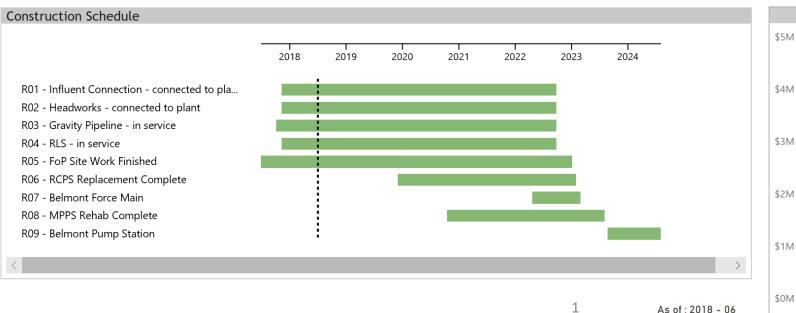

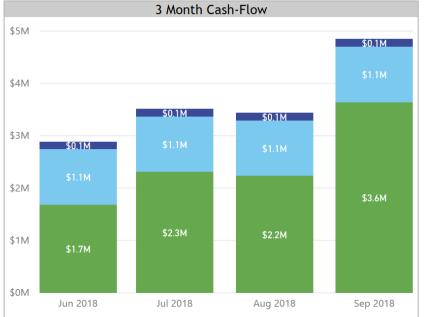
Overview

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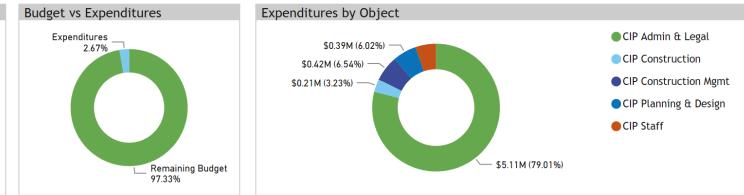

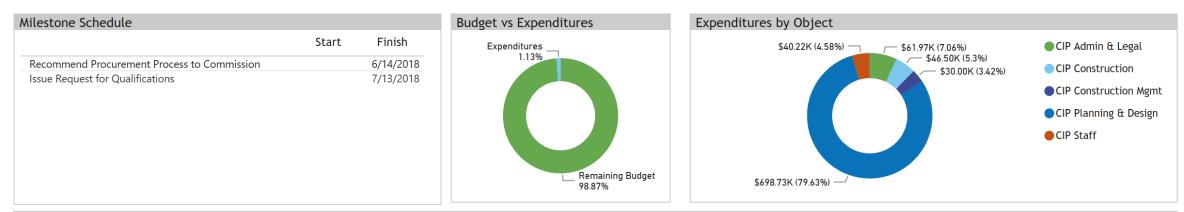

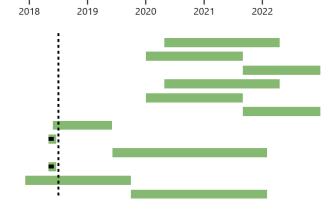

ITEM 8A

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION AWARDING CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT FOR CHLORINE CONTACT TANK PASS 1 SURFACE REHABILITATION PROJECT.

The Chlorine Contact Tank is in the process of being rehabilitated. There are three (3) passes in the Chlorine Contact Tank and Pass 1 is the topic of this agenda item. This is Year 2 of the ongoing rehabilitation project; some work occurred in Pass 1 last year. We are limited to working in the tank during low flow summer months which is why the work is split across several years. We anticipate that there will be two other rehabilitation contracts for the remaining passes (2 and 3); one in 2019 and one in 2020.

The work was publicly advertised and SVCW received two (2) bids. The low bid was from F.D. Thomas for \$389,359.00. Ms. Herrera is familiar with this company and they have a good reputation in the industry. Therefore, it is recommended that the contract be awarded to F.D. Thomas.

Move adoption of RESOLUTION APPROVING CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT DOCUMENTS FOR CHLORINE CONTACT TANK (CCT) PASS 1 SURFACE REHABILITATION PROJECT (CIP #9107); ACCEPTING BID OF LOWEST RESPONSIBLE BIDDER, REJECTING ALL OTHER BIDS; AND AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT, DIRECTING RETURN OF SECURITY DEPOSITS AND AUTHORIZING MANAGER TO APPROVE CONTRACT CHANGE ORDERS UP TO TEN PERCENT OF THE CONTRACT PRICE FOR SAID PROJECT – F.D. THOMAS, INC. (\$389,359) The Resolution carried by Unanimous Roll Call Vote

Commissioner Seybert asked why work was only able to be completed during summer months. Ms. Herrera responded that the tank pass needs to be completely emptied and dry and, therefore only 2/3 of the total capacity is available. Since we only have two passes available while work is in progress, it needs to be done during summer time low flow periods.

ITEM 8B

CONSIDERATION OF RESOLUTION AWARDING STAGE 2A AMENDMENT TO PROGRESSIVE DESIGN-BUILD AGREEMENT FOR FRONT OF PLANT PROJECT.

The Stage 2A Amendment covers concrete piles fabrication and installation. There are three hundred and six (306) piles that are incorporated into this authorization with an allowance for an additional 40 piles, should it be found they are needed. Construction is slated for late July. This will be the first of three Stage 2 amendments, as noted in the Staff Report. Authorization for the piles is requested because these are on the critical path for construction; they need to be placed before any other work can begin.

Ms. Herrera noted that the original Design-Build Agreement anticipated early Stage 2 packages. The recommendation is to approve the Design-Build Stage 2A Amendment.

Commissioner Lieberman asked since the work will be done over the winter, will weather be a delaying factor? Ms. Herrera responded that delays are not anticipated and that is why staff has decided to release early construction packages and get the underground work done first.

Commissioner Seybert commented that the allowance is essentially a not-to-exceed amount and requested a report back if the allowance for additional piles is needed. Ms. Herrera concurred that this is a not-to-exceed amount and use of the allowance would be reported back to the Commission.

Commissioner Seybert noted that this Item was discussed and approved at the May 10th meeting but needed to be a regular Agenda Item rather than a Consent Item.

Commissioner Lieberman had a question regarding the allocation of costs for use of this Line of Credit when it is drawn down; is it based on ownership? And is there a case when the percentage would change based on the way each member agency is using it?

Mr. Anderson responded that the assumption on our Line of Credit is that every Member participates according to the JPA. We only use this line of credit to cover a) SRF out of pocket expenses and b) if we deplete our Bond Funds. Every member agency participates in SRF funding. At this point we don't have any member contributing cash. Depending on bond timing, we would use this line of credit to span between issuances. In both of those scenarios, it is participation according to the JPA.

Commissioner Lieberman requested that if for any reason, we do deviate from this participation allocation, it be brought to the attention of the Commission.

Commissioner Seybert noted that, in May 2017 the Commission approved the use of OCIP. Ms. Herrera agreed and stated that SVCW received proposals from insurance companies on May 25th and, as the Staff Report indicates, coverage is for Workers' Compensation through General Liability, Builder's Risk and Owner's Protective Professional Indemnity, which is essentially Errors and Omission Insurance. Significant savings are anticipated and on the last page of the Staff Report we indicate what would likely be the savings given a typical loss occurrence. If there are fewer losses than typical, SVCW's savings would increase. In addition to the anticipated savings, the coverages for the Agency are more robust than if the contractors were giving us insurance.

Commissioner Grassilli commented that, in theory, the contractors who bid on the jobs will not have insurance lines and Commissioner Seybert clarified that this is where the savings come from. Ms. Herrera responded that that was correct.

Mr. Anderson noted that currently the JPA calls for both a Treasurer and Controller. When SVCW was formed, both of these roles were assigned to Redwood City and also since that time, SVCW has used Redwood City's Accounting system. Both SVCW and Redwood City staff have agreed that each agencies' accounting system needs replacing; SVCW is implementing a new system and will "go live" July 1. Redwood City is likewise planning for a new system. At this time, it makes sense to segregate the two duties still giving Redwood City the oversight they need, while allowing SVCW to take on Treasurer role. The amendment to the JPA defines the new roles.

Commissioner Lieberman confirmed that procedurally the Commission was voting on the proposed JPA amendment and then the Member Agencies each would vote on the amendment. Ms. Herrera confirmed this was the case.

Commissioner Seybert asked Mr. Anderson to describe how business is currently being done currently.

Mr. Anderson responded that four years ago when he came on board, SVCW took on additional responsibilities, including reporting functions. The system of control is still within Redwood City, but today it is a much more of a coordinated effort as staffing changes have occurred in both agencies. Mr. Anderson does not anticipate that, in terms of current responsibilities, there would be much change.

Commissioner Seybert noted that 1) essentially this is the JPA catching up to how business is being done and 2) Redwood City will take over hiring the Auditor which will then provide additional oversight compared to the practice.

Mr. Anderson responded that that was correct.

Commissioner Seybert also noted that there were other items in the JPA that need cleaning up and he wanted to go on record that as soon as the Commission establishes future SVCW leadership, JPA changes are made a priority. Commissioner Otte echoed these statements.

Commissioner Lieberman asked Mr. Anderson if he has had any discussions with the staff of the Member Agencies. Mr. Anderson responded that he has had extensive discussions with Redwood City staff and also notified the other Agencies' finance staff and shared with them the language of the Agreement.

Commissioner Lieberman commented that the Finance staff will be preparing the report for the respective Councils and they may need assistance from Mr. Anderson to prepare the agenda items. Mr. Anderson confirmed that he has is available for assistance.

Commissioner Grassilli noted that the item was on the San Carlos Agenda for their next meeting.

Commissioner Otte clarified that this item would be presented to his Board for approval. Ms. Herrera confirmed.

Ms. Fitzgerald added that she and the Redwood City attorney had discussed the matter extensively and approved the language.

Commissioner Lieberman wanted to ensure that the discussions between attorneys would be conveyed to the Member Agencies.

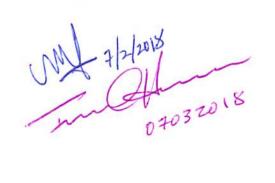

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SUBMITTAL OF LETTER OF INTEREST AND APPLICATION TO THE ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY SEEKING WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCE AND INNOVATIONS ACT (WIFIA) LOANS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$220 MILLION

<u>ISSUE</u>

Adoption of Resolutions Authorizing Silicon Valley Clean Water (SVCW) to Submit a Letter of Interest to the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Seeking up to \$220 Million in Secured Loans from the Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) Program and, if selected, to Submit an Application for Secured Loan.

BACKGROUND

SVCW launched a ten-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP) in May 2008 to address critical infrastructure needs. When complete the CIP will return SVCW facilities to a condition that ensures efficient and effective operation of the treatment and conveyance processes in a cost effective manner for future decades. As of May 2018, over 100 projects had been completed and spending was approximately \$267 million.

SVCW is entering a concentrated period of spending to complete its Regional Environmental Sewer Conveyance Upgrade (RESCU). With remaining expenditures of nearly \$400 million for RESCU alone, it is critical to minimize the financial burden borne by current and future ratepayers. SVCW therefore employs a debt strategy that strives to obtain the lowest-cost financing available. This strategy also aims to maintain or improve credit ratings and provide financial flexibility. SVCW has thus far funded the CIP through a blend of State Revolving Fund (SRF) loans, Tax-Exempt Municipal Revenue Bonds, cash funding, Lines of Credit (LOCs), and state grants. The overall CIP (RESCU plus Treatment Plant projects) estimates \$565 million in capital expenditures remaining (in 2017 dollars), SVCW must leverage the capital markets to complete the CIP.

DISCUSSION

To date, nearly \$430 million of funding has been secured for capital projects. Most recently, SVCW issued \$149 million in 2018 wastewater revenue bonds and received cash commitments of \$30 million from members. As of May 31, 2018, approximately \$126.7 million of the 2018 bond proceeds and \$25.4 million of cash contribution commitments remains.

In the debt strategy described in the January 2018 Long Range Financial Plan (LRFP) it was recognized that the SRF loan program is oversubscribed and, therefore, unlikely to be a significant borrowing source for SVCW. Since the LRFP was completed, however, staff has been notified of possible SRF funds available for the RESCU projects in the amount of \$169 million. Staff is currently pursuing this

amount from the SRF loan program. The LRFP recommends that SVCW use a Hybrid debt structure that draws from a blend of revenue bonds and other governmental loans, including the State's SRF loan program and EPA's WIFIA loan program.

Staff proposes that SVCW seek loan funds from the WIFIA program. If awarded, SVCW could benefit from the WIFIA program's low cost and its attractive benefits such as lower interest rates, payment deferral and extended maturities. It is assumed that all Member Entities would participate in a WIFIA debt agreement, though staff can adjust Members' proportionate share of the loan if alternative methods are chosen by certain members.

The WIFIA application and approval process involves three phases: 1) Project Selection, 2) Project Approval and 3) Negotiation and Closing. The first phase requires the submittal of a Letter of Interest where the EPA selects projects it intends to fund. If selected, the second phase begins with the receiving agency notifying EPA of its interest followed by submittal of an application.

There are two recommended actions as part of this agenda item. The first is for the first phase of the process and would authorize SVCW to submit a Letter of Interest seeking WIFIA loans up to the maximum value of 49% of the project, or \$220 million.

If SVCW is selected by EPA to submit an application, the second phase will begin. Upon notification, SVCW will have ten days to advise the EPA of its formal intent to apply for the loan. After notification, SVCW staff and consultants will begin preparing the application for credit assistance. In anticipation of an invitation, the second proposed action item authorizes SVCW to respond to EPA positively and, in turn, apply for the WIFIA loan.

SVCW previously submitted a Letter of Interest to EPA in March 2017 but was not selected by the EPA to submit an application. Many discussions occurred between SVCW Chief Financial Officer and the WIFIA loan program managers to understand the rationale for project selection and determine how best to position SVCW for future success. What was learned will be incorporated into the 2018 Letter of Interest.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Versus a funding strategy that predominantly uses the capital markets to issue wastewater revenue bonds, the Hybrid debt structure seeks low-cost governmental loans that could reduce costs by approximately \$45 million in current dollars over the debt's amortization period (30 years).

The recommended actions are to 1) authorize SVCW to submit a letter of interest to the EPA and, if selected, to 2) respond positively to EPA within ten days of notification and submit an application for credit assistance. There is no financial

impact associated with the first recommended action, as staff will gather information readily available. Preparing an application will require assistance from a consultant and is not expected to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars for preparation.

2018 CONFLICT OF INTEREST UPDATE

ISSUE

To conduct its biennial review and approval of the Silicon Valley Clean Water's Conflict of Interest Code and list of designated positions, Exhibit A (attached).

BACKGROUND

The Political Reform Act requires all local agencies which have adopted Conflict of Interest Codes to review their Conflict of Interest Code biennially every evennumbered year and amend their Code if changes are necessary. The Code lists each position within the Authority filled by individuals who make or participate in making governmental decisions which could affect their personal interests. The Code also requires individuals holding those positions to file annually a disclosure of certain personal interests. This Commission last reviewed the Code in January 2018 to amend job titles to designated positions

DISCUSSION

At this time, no amendment is necessary and the Authority is merely performing biennial review. This Resolution confirms that the SVCW Conflict of Interest Code has been reviewed.

GRAVITY PIPELINE PROJECT (CIP #6008) DESIGN BUILD STAGE 1 AGREEMENT AMENDMENT

ISSUE

Approval of Gravity Pipeline Project (CIP #6008) Design-Build Stage 1 Agreement Amendments for Barnard-Bessac Joint Venture.

BACKGROUND

SVCW's Regional Environmental Sewer Conveyance Upgrade (RESCU) Program includes conveyance system improvements to transport wastewater from member agencies' collection systems to the SVCW wastewater treatment plant. A major component of the conveyance system is the Gravity Pipeline project to be constructed by tunneling methods from the north edge of Inner Bair Island to new Front of Plant facilities at the treatment plant.

In October 2017, after a thorough and robust selection process, the Commission approved the Design-Build Agreement with Barnard-Bessac Joint Venture (BBJV). The Agreement addresses both Stage 1 and Stage 2. Stage 1 brings the design from the 10% design level to approximately the 60% design level and includes preparation and negotiation of pricing for Stage 2. Stage 2 then includes completing the design and construction of the Gravity Pipeline Project. Stage 2 will be brought to the Commission for consideration as an amendment to the Design-Build Agreement; the first Stage 2 package is anticipated to be presented to the Commission in August 2018.

Stage 1 services have been ongoing since the Notice to Proceed was issued to BBJV on October 123, 2017. BBJV has fully embraced the collaborative nature of a design-build project and work is progressing well.

In December 2017, staff recommended, and the Commission approved, authorization for the Manager to make project contract change order decisions up to a dollar amount of \$300,000 for Design Build projects.

The premise of this authorization was driven by the need to keep the Design-Builder working when unexpected challenges arise or immanent project decisions are needed. Keeping the design build process moving forward is of utmost importance in containing project costs and work should continue without interruption until the Commission can convene. For change orders between \$50,000 (the Manager's base approval level) and \$300,000, the Manager will report and submit for ratification all changes in excess of \$50,000 to the Commission in writing at the next special or regularly scheduled Commission meeting. This authorization was included in Revision C to the SVCW Design-Build Policy 2016-01.

DISCUSSION

Many items of work have made significant progress in the Stage 1 period. Significantly, the geotechnical work, system hydraulics, tunnel boring machine specifications and launch shaft design have reached 50-60% design levels. Additionally, outreach to subcontractors for shaft construction, instrumentation and monitoring services, and concrete tunnel segments has occurred as well as discussions with pipe manufacturers and the electrical utility (P.G.&E.) for substation placement.

Recently, there has arisen one item of work that, if approved, would provide significant benefit to the project. The item was authorized by the Manager on June 28, 2018 in the amount not to exceed \$164,360. This agenda item seeks to have the Commission ratify this authorization according to the design build policy.

Stage 1 Amendment Items:

Amendment No. 6 – Progress design from the 60% level to the construction ready level (~100%) of the airport access shaft. This is the shaft from which the tunnel boring machine will launch; in turn, tunneling to Bair Island, then relaunching at this shaft and tunneling to the wastewater treatment plant. Moving the design work forward will allow all subsurface work to proceed as well as to ensure accurate specifications for ordering the tunnel boring machine. The not to exceed amount is \$164,360 and was approved by the Manager on June 28, 2018.

This item covers work that is necessary to complete the project. Because of the time criticality of this item, as described above, the Manager recommends that it be authorized by the Commission as an amendment to the Stage 1 Design-Build Agreement. The alternative would be to make them part of the Stage 2 Design-Build Amendment however, the first Stage 2 amendment is not anticipated to be completed until August or October 2018; losing two to four months for this authorization would have significant negative impacts to, not only the Gravity Pipeline project, but also the Front-of-Plant and Pump Station Improvements design-build projects.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

The scope represented by this work will be funded from the Gravity Pipeline project (CIP #6008), which has an allocated budget in the 2017 CIP Update of \$232 million. To date, approximately \$17 million has been expended and encumbered. The total not-to-exceed amount for this amendment is \$164,360.

<u>ISSUE</u>

Approve Progressive Design Build Requests for Qualifications and Approve Collaborative Strategies Consulting Inc. Task Order for Project Management Services for the Pump Station Improvement Project

BACKGROUND

Implementation of SVCW's RESCU Program has been ongoing since 2014; major milestones were reached in April 2017 with certification of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and the start of two major projects, Gravity Pipeline and Front of Plant projects. The Gravity Pipeline project is the replacement of the 48-inch and 54- inch force main segments between Bair Island and the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The Front-of-Plant project is the Receiving Lift Station, Headworks, the Influent Connector Pipeline, and other support facilities. Both projects were implemented as progressive design build projects and to date the experience with this project approach has been successful.

The next major RESCU project is the Pump Station Improvement Project. This project focus will be rehabilitation of the member agency pump stations and a short section of the remaining force main. The project includes the Menlo Park Pump Station, Redwood City Pump Station and Belmont Pump Station and a new Belmont Force Main. The San Carlos Pump station will be de-commissioned as part of the Gravity Pipeline project and San Carlos' wastewater flows will gravity into the pipeline.

In January 2016, the Commission approved the Design-Build policy, Policy No. 2016-01, (as amended). The policy establishes a procedure for implementing the Design-Build process for delivery of projects in accordance with the provisions of Public Contract Code Section 22160. The policy is applicable for projects over \$1 million and seeks to provide SVCW with the "Best Value" project delivery. Per the legislative act authorizing use of design-build, "Best Value" means a value determined by evaluation of objective criteria that may include, but not be limited to price, features, functions, life- cycle costs, experience, and past performance.

The procedure involves the following steps, each defined in detail within the policy:

- Manager appoints a D-B Procurement Team
- Procurement Team prepares documents setting forth scope and estimated price of project ("Procurement Documents")
- Procurement Team prepares Request for Qualifications
- Manager submits Procurement Documents to Commission for approval concurrent with recommendation to issue RFQ (subject of this Commission action item)

- Prequalification process commences, including the requirement for use of a skilled and trained workforce
- Procurement Team prepares a Request for Proposal to be issued to the prequalified D-B firms
- Upon receipt of proposals, Procurement Team evaluates and ranks the firms; Manager submits to the Commission the tentatively selected firm with a recommendation to award the contract
- The award of the D-B contract is publicly announced by Manager with a statement regarding the basis of the award

DISCUSSION

The Procurement Team has been assigned and has worked diligently with SVCW's Operations, Maintenance, and Engineering staff, senior management, other project managers and the engineering consultant (Owner's Advisors) to draft the Requests for Qualifications (RFQ) for the project. The project team was able to learn from the two previous projects' RFQ processes increasing the efficiency and effectiveness of the RFQ development process for the Pump Stations Improvements project. The RFQ is ready for issuance upon Commission approval.

The Pump Station Improvement Project will use the Progressive Design Build (PDB) process. The project's RFQ will possess unique criteria and scoring for the criteria. The process for obtaining Statement of Qualifications and Proposals from Design Build (DB) firms is as follows:

Step 1 – Qualifications Step

- SVCW issues the RFQ
- DB firms submit Statements of Qualifications
- The Procurement Team's Selection Panel reviews the SOQs, checks references, and invites the top firms to interview
- Interviews are held with the top firms
- The Selection Panel combines the scores from SOQ, references, and interviews and shortlists the top firms. This project the short list will not be more than 3 firms.

Step 2 – Proposal Step

- SVCW issues the RFP to the top shortlisted DB firms
- DB firms and Procurement Team meet for Confidential Meeting
- DB firms submit Proposals
- Interviews are held with key personnel from the DB firms
- The Selection Panel scores the proposals and interviews and makes recommendation to Manager for award of the design-build contract.

It is anticipated that Steps 1 and 2 will span from mid-July 2018 through January 2019 and that the Manager will make a recommendation for awarding a design-build

contract to the Commission at the February 14, 2019 meeting.

Once a DB firm is contracted to perform the work on the project, the process that will be followed is:

Stage 1 – Preconstruction Services:

- DB firm progresses the design from 10% level to approximately 60% level
- Throughout Stage 1, project costs are updated and decisions are made by SVCW
- At 60% design, a price for Stage 2 work will be negotiated

Stage 2 – Construction and Startup Services

- DB firm bring the 60% design to a level suitable for construction to begin (100% design)
- Construction can be "phased"; i.e., one portion of construction can begin while design of other portions is still being completed.
- Upon construction completion, facilities begin the startup phase, including operator training.
- Upon completion, the project will be presented to the Commission for acceptance

The anticipated schedule for the Pump Station Improvement Project Stages 1 and 2 will run from March 2019 through late Fall 2022. The timing for startup of the new pump stations and force main will be coordinated with the completion of the Gravity Pipe project.

Since 2017, Collaborative Strategies Consulting Inc. (CSC) has been providing project management services for the Menlo Park Pump Station, Redwood City Pump Station, Belmont Pump Station and the Belmont Force Main projects and staff has negotiated a task order scope and budget for CSC to continue project management services for the Pump Station Improvements project DB procurement process, through Stage 1 of the project and into Stage 2. CSC provided similar services on SVCW's 48-in Force Main replacement project (from Redwood City pump station to the north end of Bair Island). The project was extremely complex, involved multiple regulatory agencies and was extremely successful, coming in ahead of schedule and within budget.

CSC's task order will span the period of July 2018 to the end of 2019, when it is anticipated that Stage 1 services of the DB firm will progress into Stage 2. At that time, the scope and budget for another task order to cover the Stage 2 work period will be presented to the Commission for approval. The amount of the task order scope is \$460,530 or 0.007% of the total estimated capital cost for the Pump Station Improvement Project. This percentage is considered to be well within industry standards for projects of this level of design, construction and environmental complexity. All work is authorized and performed on a time and material basis

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The work on the three pump stations and force main are described in the 2017 CIP Update with the allocated budgets as listed below.

CIP #7004 – Menlo Park Pump Station	\$25	million
CIP #7005 – Redwood City Pump Station	\$31	million
CIP #7006 – Belmont Pump Station	\$10	million
CIP #7011 – Belmont Force Main	\$3	million

The action today for approving the Pump Station Improvement Project Progressive Design Build Request for Qualifications has minimal financial impact as it does not obligate SVCW to expenditures of funds for the projects. It is anticipated staff will bring a contract to the Commission for approval in February 2019. Project Management services is on a time and material basis with a not-to-exceed budget of \$460,530 or 0.007% of the total estimated capital cost for the Pump Station Improvement Project.

RECOMMENDATION

FRONT OF PLANT PROJECT (CIP #6013, 6014, AND 9160) DESIGN BUILD AGREEMENT – STAGE 2B AMENDMENT

<u>ISSUE</u>

Approval of Amendment 2B to the Front of Plant (FoP) Design-Build Agreement for JF Shea/Parsons Joint Venture

BACKGROUND

SVCW's Regional Environmental Sewer Conveyance Upgrade (RESCU) Program includes conveyance system improvements to transport wastewater from member agencies' collection systems to the SVCW wastewater treatment plant. A major component of the conveyance system is the Front of Plant projects that include: 1) Receiving Lift Station (RLS) to lift the wastewater from the gravity pipeline to the surface to be 2) screened and de-gritted by the new Headworks (HWKS) before flowing to the treatment plant primary influent channel in 3) the new Influent Pipeline (IPL). The Front of Plant project is composed of the RLS, HWKS and IPL in addition to various electrical, chemical storage, site civil and odor control projects.

In November 2017, the Commission approved the Shea/Parsons Joint Venture (SPJV) Design-Build Agreement which included provisions for both Stage 1 and Stage 2 activities. Stage 1 activities include design services to bring conceptual designs from the 10 percent level to approximately the 60 percent design level at which point, Stage 2 activities (design completion and construction) could be defined and budgeted. The November 2017 action by the Commission approved the scope of work and budget for Stage 1, with the anticipation that Stage 2 would be authorized at a later date when the design work was completed sufficiently to scope and budget Stage 2 activities.

The Design-Build Agreement allows for release of Stage 2 activities in "packages" rather than waiting for the entire project to reach 60% design. This is a significant benefit to the progressive design-build process in that it allows portions of the design to progress faster than other portions.

In June 2018, the Commission approved the first Stage 2 amendment (Stage 2A Amendment). That amendment authorized pile fabrication and installation for the RLS piping supports, the Headworks Facility and the Influent Pipeline. Completing underground work early will save cost and schedule on the future Stage 2 work. Since last month, an opportunity for additional efficiency was identified and, therefore, staff anticipates that Stage 2 of the work will be split into four packages as follows:

Stage 2A Amendment – Reinforced Concrete Pile fabrication and installation.
Stage 2B Amendment – Support of Excavation mobilization and site preparation
Stage 2C Amendment – Deep Shaft Construction (expected in August 2018)
Stage 2D Amendment – Completion of FoP project (expected in December 2018)

DISCUSSION

Stage 2B Amendment is a predecessor to the Stage 2C Deep Shaft Construction amendment that will be brought to the Commission in August 2018. Stage 2B covers mobilization and site preparation activities by the specialty subcontractor who will be responsible for the deep shaft construction. It also covers work required by the engineer-of-record to bring the deep shafts' design from the 60% level to the 100% level.

This Stage 2B Amendment is recommended after rigorous value engineering and comprehensive engineering feasibility reviews. SVCW management has held detailed negotiations and discussion with SPJV and is confident of the cost, schedule and risk reductions using this approach to the deep shaft construction.

The Stage 2B Amendment includes the following components:

- Tunnel boring machine Retrieval shaft and RLS shaft final designs
- Hydraulics and Computational Fluid Dynamics analysis
- Soil Borings and Laboratory Analysis
- Revised Physical Modeling of reconfigured shafts
- Shaft Constructor mobilization, Site preparation and Guide Walls setup

The total authorization requested for Amendment 2B Amendment described above is \$1,299,447. It is anticipated that the cost for the deep shafts construction (upcoming Stage 2C Amendment) will be approximately \$11 million for the specialty subcontractor and approximately \$4 million for the Shea/Parsons construction team.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The scope represented by this work will be funded from the following Front of Plant CIP projects.

- CIP #6013 Receiving Lift Station and FoP Site Civil
- CIP #6014 Influent Pipeline
- CIP #9160 WWTP Headworks

These CIP projects have a total allocated budget of \$126 million. To date, approximately \$7.6 million has been expended. The total not-to-exceed amount for this agenda item is \$1,299,447.

RECOMMENDATION

Move adoption of RESOLUTION APPROVING STAGE 2B DESIGN BUILD AGREEMENT AMENDMENT FOR FRONT OF PLANT PROJECT (CIP #6013, 6014, 9160); AND AUTHORIZING MANAGER TO APPROVE CONTRACT CHANGE ORDERS UP TO TEN PERCENT OF THE CONTRACT PRICE FOR SAID STAGE 2B AMENDMENT – Shea/Parsons Joint Venture - (\$1,299,447)

APPOINT SVCW MANAGER

<u>ISSUE</u>

Appoint Teresa Herrera as Manager of Silicon Valley Clean Water (SVCW)

BACKGROUND

During closed session at the Commission's June 28, 2018 meeting, the Commission interviewed Teresa Herrera for the position Manager of SVCW due to the vacancy of the position by former Manager Daniel T. Child. An ad hoc committee was formed by the Chair consisting of Commissioners Otte and Grassilli to negotiate and recommend salary and benefits for Ms. Herrera. Ms. Herrera was previously appointed Acting Manager on a temporary basis with an upgrade in pay pursuant to the Authority's Temporary Upgrade Policy (Administrative Policy No. 1989-03) that establishes a higher salary rate for an employee who is temporarily working outside his/her classification.

DISCUSSION

Section 3.5 of the JPA requires that the position of Manager of SVCW be appointed by the Commission. Moreover, Government Code Section 94953(c)(3), requires that the Commission orally report out during an open meeting the salary amount of any executive officer of a local agency before taking final action. This requirement was added by the legislature following the City of Bell scandal to ensure greater transparency concerning the compensation of high-level officials. Local Agency Executive is defined to include the chief executive officer of a local agency (e.g., city manager). In this case, the SVCW Manager performs the duties of a chief executive officer and, therefore, qualifies under the statute.

For purposes of considering the appointment of SVCW Manager due to the vacancy of the position, the ad hoc committee met with Ms. Herrera and negotiated a monthly salary of \$25,000, along with other benefits including paid vacation, severance pay, performance pay, housing allowance and medical, life and retirement benefits. Once Ms. Herrera is appointed SVCW Manager and the salary and benefits are approved by the Commission, a written employment agreement will be prepared and presented to this Commission for consideration and ratification at a later meeting.

FINACIAL IMPACT

If appointed Manager of SVCW, Ms. Herrera will be paid a monthly salary of \$25,000.00 and receive a negotiated benefits' package approved by this Commission.

RECOMMENDATION

i. Chair to orally report out recommendation that Manager's monthly salary amount be set at \$ 25,000

ii. Move approval of RESOLUTION APPOINTING TERESA HERRERA AS MANAGER OF SILICON VALLEY CLEAN WATER AND ESTABLISHING MANAGER COMPENSATION
